***APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

Chair Knoff called for a motion on the May 2017 meeting minutes. George Faucher made the motion to approve the May 2017 Minutes, seconded by Terry Carr. The motion carried.

STATE EMERGENCY RESPONSE COMMISSION (SERC) MEETINGS

Mr. Anderson provided an overview of the Training Task Force, LEPC Chair/Coordinator, and SERC meetings that took place July 20-21, 2017 in St. Petersburg, Florida. He highlighted the following:

Training Task Force Meeting

FDEM website has been updated to include a training section for the LEPCs to reference free training information and contacts. Several plans and curriculum needs updating, an assessment will be conducted followed by the issuance of an RFP or the LEPCs could be asked to complete the updates. Also, Mr. Anderson will be spearheading negotiations on rates for common training vendors in an attempt to lower the costs of training. The 6th Annual HazMat Symposium is scheduled for January 16-19, 2018 with registration beginning September 1, 2017. There is a change in the symposium in which the competition, now limited to 12 teams, has been moved to Tuesday followed by a class session on Wednesday to review best practices.

Mr. Anderson announced that the St. Johns County Fire and Rescue team participated in the North Carolina Association of Hazardous Materials Responders competition and placed third out of 13 teams that participated. Congrats to St. Johns County F/R.

LEPC Chairs and SERC Meetings

Mr. Anderson highlighted the changes to the chemical facility lists for site visits, which includes the use of the new EPlan database. However, there are some inherent issues that are requiring a vetting of the facilities included in the database. He also spoke about the, now official, DEP Notification Rule, published on July 1st. However, although DEP must be notified, this does not negate obligation to notify the State Watch Office. Both must be notified of any pollution in your area. The adoption of the Small Quantity Generator/Large Quantity Generator Rule has been delayed until 2018 or 2019. The Risk Management Program Rule has also been pushed back to 2019. FDEM is currently updating their portable access, which will include a training site of available free training through a variety of sources. The SERC did not have a quorum, and therefore did not approve of new membership changes.

CURRENT BUSINESS/REPORTS

Hazardous Material Release Report

Mr. Anderson provided an overview of Section 304 Release Investigations, as well as injuries or deaths from HazMat incidents within the district.

LEPC Contract Changes

An overview of the LEPC contract was provided. Included with the standard requirements were new tasks such as, conduct at least two public presentations in the district on the EPCRA program that includes an overview of the LEPC, assist with at least one hazmat related exercise or facilitate a hazmat tabletop exercise, provide at least one shelter-in-place presentation and one evacuation workshop in the district, and provide planning and coordination of Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) training as well as transportation and Community Awareness and Emergency Response (TRANSCAER) training. Mr. Anderson encouraged members to contact him if they are interested in implementing an exercise or participate in public outreach.

Updated LEPC Website

The LEPC's website has been updated and located at www.neflepc.org. This website will house the membership list, meeting information, Tier II reporting information, videos and presentations, and our contact information.

Nassau County HazMat Commodity Flow Study

LEPC contracted for a commodity flow study in Nassau County at six north/south corridors and one east/west corridor. The study identified hazardous materials transported through Nassau County's roadways such as gasoline, diesel fuel, caustic soda or hydroxide solution, etc.

St. Johns County HazMat Commodity Flow Study

St. Johns County will be conducting a pilot test of the HazFlow Application, pending State approval. The HazFlow App was developed for the Louisiana State Police's Joint Emergency Services Training Center. The aim is to simplify the collection and automation of hazardous commodity flow studies. The pilot project will focus on an area including SR 16, CR 210 and I-95. The scope of the project is to get a comprehensive look at rail and high traffic corridors, analyzing existing data, collecting railroad data, and conducting field observations using the App. Members were encouraged to contact Mr. Anderson if they are interested in taking part in the pilot program. This new technology can be an opportunity to reduce cost and provide a better product.

Toxic Release Inventory Data

The EPA has Toxic Release Inventory (TRI) provides a lot of information about facilities in local communities. The TRI tracks the management of certain toxic chemicals posing a threat to health and environment. Its goal is to provide public information about TRI chemicals in the community. Information can be obtained at www.epa.gov/tri/nationalanalysis. The 'my right to know' (myRTK) tool was highlighted, which can be used to locate specific facilities TRI information. In terms of the LEPC's community outreach program, this could be an opportunity to implement things like 'Good Neighbor Agreement,' etc. Discussion followed.

GATOR Mapping Tool

The Geospatial Assessment Tool for Operations and Response (GATOR) is the State's GIS web based mapping tool. It now includes a tab, under critical facilities, for Hazardous Materials EPlan, and Section 302 Extremely Hazardous Substance facilities. Other beneficial uses were highlighted, including location of chemical facilities and proximity to critical facilities or population, and informational resources. The website to access this tool is <https://maps.floridadisaster.org/gator/map.html>. Discussion followed.

A concern was raised as to the availability to allow anyone to access information, which could be dangerous in the hands of terrorists. It was recommended that layers of security should be included to protect facilities.

Pipeline Mapping Tool

The Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration developed the Pipeline Information Management Mapping Application for use by pipeline operators and federal, state, and local government officials only. This App contains hazardous liquid and gas transmission pipelines, liquefied Natural Gas plants and breakout tank information. General pipeline maps, produced by the App, were highlighted for the Members information.

SUB-COMMITTEE REPORTS

Training – Chief Silcox highlighted the training completed in the last quarter: 20 people trained in **HazMat160 Hybrid**, 20 people trained in **HazMat Vessel Leak Containment and Patching**, Seven (7) people trained in **Advanced HazMat Life Support (16-hour)**. Free training included **Ethanol-Renewable Fuels Association**. Training currently taking place is the **HazMat160 Hybrid**, in which 24 people are attending. This completes

the HMEP Grant training year. Upcoming free training for **Radiological Classes-Florida Department of Health** will be offered Nov 7-9 at JFRD – Operations, Nov 14-16 at Clay County – Operations, Nov 28-30 at Nassau County – Operations, Dec 12 at Clay County – Technician, Dec 13 at Nassau County – Technician, and Dec 14 at JFRD – Technician. Chief Silcox expressed his appreciation for Mr. Anderson’s efforts in obtaining free classes for first responders in the LEPC District. The Training Committee is currently planning for the upcoming year.

Special Projects

The Special Projects Subcommittee will only be activated once a member of the LEPC would like to spearhead and implement a project, with the assistance of the LEPC and its membership. Any member can take the lead on a project. Examples: Shelter-N-Place, speaking engagements, public access, fixed facilities exercises, anything HazMat related, TRI related, etc.

PRESENTATIONS/ISSUE ITEMS

Pipelines: Natural Gas Emergency Response

Mr. Michael Laycock, Damage Prevention/Public Awareness, Florida Gas Transmission Company, provided an overview of pipelines throughout Florida, the dangers associated with them when proper protocols are not taken and the emergency response team’s role.

 - 65 classroom courses and 7 hands on training totaling 196 hours of training. Over 400 people are registered

 - DEP Notification Rule (<http://dep.state.fl.us/pollutionnotice/>)
 - Effective July 1, 2017
 - Section 403.077, F.S., the Department is establishing a method for regulated entities to submit Public Notices of Pollution for reportable releases. Additionally, the Department is making

available to the public all Notices received to date as well as offering an e-mail subscription service for interested parties to be informed of Notices submitted for their area of interest.

- SQG/LQG Rule pushed back until state adopted in 2018 or 2019
- RMP rule pushed back to 2019
- Port of Pensacola is getting a Maritime Fire Simulator funded by FEMA
 - Looking at the possibility of using it as a maritime hazmat simulator
- HMEP Contract will be the same this year, but next year it will only be valid until the end of the Federal Fiscal year.

RE: Hazardous Materials Incident Reports

The attached tables and graphs provide information on all hazardous materials incident reports received by the State Watch Office. The incident reports are reviewed by Hazardous Materials Planning staff on a daily basis for compliance and verification purposes. The information helps identify potential Section 304 violators, as well as facilities which may have an obligation to report under other sections of EPCRA and the Risk Management Planning (RMP) programs.

Table 1 - lists incidents by LEPC District for the period of 6/1/2017 through 8/30/17. "Potential Section 304 Investigations" are incidents involving the release of Extremely Hazardous Substances (EHS) or Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) chemicals at fixed facilities and are investigated by State-level staff. In order for an incident to be covered under Section 304, the EHS or CERCLA chemical must meet or exceed its designated Reportable Quantity (RQ) and have potential for offsite exposure.

Table 2 – lists incidents by LEPC District for the period of 6/1/2017 through 8/31/17. The list covers fixed facility and transportation related incidents and differentiates between chemical-related and traffic accident-related deaths. Please note that official causes of death are determined by the medical examiner's office and may take up to 90 days for the final report.

Graph I - depicts total incidents within the State from 1/1/2002 through 8/30/2017.





THE CSX HAZARDOUS MATERIALS DEPARTMENT hosted several training events in Northeast Florida during the first quarter of 2017. The training was requested by the Northeast Florida Local Emergency Response Planning Committee (LEPC) Training Task Force. The training resulted in just over 400 responders (some repeat for various levels of training) that were able to attend the classes and cumulated in a regional full scale hazardous materials exercise

I sat down with Eric Anderson, Senior Regional Planner, NE FL LEPC Coordinator in the fall of 2016 to review the menu of courses that CSX offers for training first responders in safely responding to railroad hazardous materials incidents. Mr. Anderson took the list of options back to the LEPC Training Task Force, which then selected and developed a plan to cover their training needs, and at the same time incorporate a regional full scale hazardous materials exercise.

The first phase of the training was a classroom presentation "Emergency Response to Railroad Incidents" along with a field

demonstration utilizing the CSX "Dome Trailer." The Dome Trailer is a training asset that can be utilized at any location regardless of if railroad operations are nearby. It is easily towable and has valves and fittings from various general service cars and pressure cars. The classroom presentation paired (continued page 24 →)

with the Dome Trailer allows awareness level training for first responders regardless of if they have firefighting responsibilities, EMS, or are part of a hazmat team.

Sixteen classes were held at fire departments in six different counties in Northeast Florida where railroad operations are present. The classes were Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from nine am till noon, except for one county, where a one-day class was appropriate for the size of the fire department. Overall, 218 first responders were trained between January and March.

The second phase of the training was hosted on the CSX Safety Train. This phase was tailored for the Northeast Florida counties with special operations / hazardous materials teams. The same class was taught Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday the first week in April with 119 attendees. The morning session was hands-on training that covered rail cars, valves and fittings, and utilization of capping kits, rupture disks, manway gaskets, and spill confinement.

The afternoon session consisted of field exercises, which allowed the teams to practice responding in full personal protective equipment, as appropriate, based on the chemical and physical properties of the commodity simulated. The three stations were: a Chlorine tank car with the vapor line leaking, requiring a C-Kit application; a Liquefied Petroleum Gas tank car that had a loose valve handle and uninstalled secondary valve plug as well as leaking vapor line, requiring a Midland Kit application; and an Alcohol N.O.S. car that had a bottom outlet valve release and bad manway gasket, both requiring hands-on correction to stop the leaks.

The final phase of the training was the 2017 Exercise of the Northeast Florida LEPC Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan for Hazardous Materials, "Operation Loco-Motion" Regional Hazardous Materials Exercise. This was a four-hour exercise with 66 participants. The field exercise scenarios practiced during the previous three days of training, were the same used during the regional full scale exercise, with the addition of a locomotive diesel fuel release simulated. The full scale exercise required establishment of an incident command system, mutual aid, and involvement by three county hazmat response teams. Participants also included the State of Florida Department of Environmental Protection, Law Enforcement, private response

contractors and consultants, as well as CSX personnel.

The involvement of the Northeast Florida LEPC, specifically the Training Task Force, resulted in a successful training event and exercise spread out over four months. This was an opportunity for the first responder community to evaluate their training needs, and utilize a partnership and resources with CSX to provide valuable training and exercises to assist with preparation for response to a hazardous materials incident involving the railroad. The benefit for CSX is extremely valuable, as it allowed for the CSX Hazardous Materials Team to become familiar with the local responders and to practice a response. In the event of a real-life scenario, the first responders and the CSX Hazardous Materials Team will not be meeting for the first time, but have trained and practiced together, to help ensure an effective and safe response. ■
