MINUTES

A meeting of the District IV Local Emergency Planning Committee was held on Wednesday, August 14, 2013, at 10:00 a.m., at the Northeast Florida Regional Council, 6850 Belfort Oaks Place, Jacksonville, Florida. Chair Richard Knoff called the meeting to order with the following members:

Chair Knoff called the meeting to order and asked the group to pledge allegiance to the flag. He then requested a roll call, which confirmed a quorum. The Chair then asked the guests to introduce themselves and he extended a special welcome to the guests. Eric Anderson stated that there were no new members.

*APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Chair Knoff called for a motion to approve the May 16, 2013 minutes. A motion to approve was made by Lt. Lamm, seconded by George Faucher. The motion carried unanimously.

OLD BUSINESS

Hazardous Material Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) Grant: Mr. Anderson said that we now have FDEM contracts regarding Planning and Training, with the same allotment as last year, about \$58,000 - \$20,000 of which will be for the planning of the transportation and hazardous materials related exercise. Mr. Anderson said he will be contacting the committee for the exercise shortly to schedule the initial meeting. In terms of training, the training committee met and gave direction on the classes that should be procured. There are two classes being offered this quarter, the first is a TRANSCAER initiative railway car class, which is being offered for two days. There will also be a compressed gas class which will be held August 28, 29 and 30th with 8 hour sessions each day. Future classes are planned to include Chemical Suicide and Clandestine Drug Lab courses. The training committee will get together to determine where to utilize the remaining funds.

Mr. Anderson explained that last year's HMEP Planning Project was a Commodity Flow Study. He introduced Ms. Sarrah Stanley, a graduate student who is interning with the Northeast Florida Regional Council, who was tasked with completing the study. Ms. Stanley discussed her findings in a presentation to the Committee. She discussed the methodology of the study, involving the recording of observed hazardous substance placards at specific locations on Regional corridors, both north/south and east/west. The observations included the placard numbers, the chemical names, the carrier names, direction of travel, date/time of observation and the type of truck. Maps were then generated and information was provided to County Emergency Management.

The second task was to prepare and submit a written report to the FDEM, together with any recommendations.

Ms. Stanley then discussed the routes, and explained the types of trucks that were observed during the study, as well as the types of materials that are typically transported by those trucks. She commented on the most common hazardous materials being transported and discussed the recommended training for response to incidents involving them.

<u>Hazards Analysis Update:</u> Mr. Anderson explained that the state has heard from the concerned parties in emergency management who conduct hazards analysis that the program needs to stay intact in some form. Ultimately, a group was assigned to conduct an investigation and to provide recommendations to the State Emergency Response Commission. The program will continue as it is for at least another year, with minor changes to the contract whereby a pre-training must be attended prior to conducting hazards analysis to ensure that everyone is on the same page. John Scott is the local contact from our committee.

Biennial Exercise Committee: We will be conducting an exercise this next year since we have a contract in hand. Mr. Anderson said that in addition to the members on the Exercise Committee, he plans to contact the Weather Service to see if they would like to participate in the exercise, since they have

modeling software that can include hazardous materials. He plans to send an email to the committee within the next week to get the planning started.

NEW BUSINESS

<u>Training Task Force Update:</u> Lt. Lamm said that the Training Task Force discussed funding. Time was spent mostly on the next Hazardous Materials Symposium. White paper submissions were sent out to solicit classes. A "hands on" element will be added to this year's symposium which will include props being provided by Seminole County. A HazMat competition will also be added in addition to the classroom and hands on elements.

Sponsorships are being solicited. TRANSCAER paid for the instructors for last year's symposium. Some of the LEPCs have offered paying hotel rooms for the instructor(s). This would not include per diem or instructor fees. Most of the instructors have indicated they will donate their time if their lodging can be covered. Response Technology has offered to donate their time and equipment for the HazMat competition, which will save a lot of time and effort on behalf of the committee.

The Symposium is set for January 23 and 24, 2014. Lt. Lamm provided the titles of some of the classes that are being considered for the Symposium. Lt. Lamm was asked if there was a possible of extending the Symposium to three days. He responded that perhaps future Symposiums can be longer, but the 2014 will be two days.

Mr. Anderson said that a TRANSCAER training exercise opportunity for a state-wide four day training at the fire college has been planned and will include chlorine, ethanol, and anhydrous ammonia training.

<u>LEPC Chair/Staff Meeting:</u> Mr. Anderson said that E-plan had sent out a plea letter requesting funding due to cuts in their budget. This was done without FDEM's knowledge. Instead, several states have decided to band together and pay for E-Plan at no additional charge to facilities. The LEPCs will continue to provide E-Plan training for facility operators and responders.

SERC Meeting: Mr. Anderson said that after the West, Texas incident, many agencies began considering how to address the ammonium nitrate issue. It is overlooked in most reporting aspects. A representative from a fertilizer industry was present at the meeting to discuss how they can become involved with the LEPCs with regard to membership and participation. This involvement doesn't really affect the northeast region, but does affect the south and southwest regions. The industry is trying to be more proactive and it definitely comes down to the LEPCs to become more proactive as well with regard to response planning.

REPORTS

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> – Chair Knoff said there is currently a balance of \$3,878.77 in the LEPC account. Although funds were used during this quarter, they have not been finalized and will show up on the report for next quarter.

<u>Training Committee Report</u> – Mr. Anderson said that three different trainings were provided, spending the remaining money for that funding cycle. Eight people were sent to the International HazMat Teams Conference in Baltimore. Lt. Lamm thanked the district for permission to attend the conference. Having

eight people enabled each person to attend a different course to bring back information and materials that can be utilized in planning the Symposium. He discussed some of the instructors and the overall event. Mr. Anderson said that in addition to the Baltimore conference, four responders from Flagler County were sent to the Advance HazMat Life Support training in May. There were also 25 members who participated Hazardous Materials Incident Command training in Nassau County. Mr. Faucher said that training completed the requirements for certification by the State. The class was only required to be 8 hours, but because Incident Command is so crucial, further training was provided and enjoyed by all the participants.

<u>Hazardous Materials Release Report</u> – Mr. Anderson discussed the tables that were included in the Agenda packet. There was a sulfuric acid release in Duval County. There was a Clay County gasoline station that was evacuated for a release. There were several transportation related incidents involving diesel fuel spills in Duval, Baker, Putnam and St. Johns Counties and also a Hydrogen Sulfide Gas release in Duval County. He then discussed the HazMat incident reports which showed a total of 169 incidents over the last year.

OTHER

West, Texas Explosion - Mr. Anderson provided a presentation on the ammonium nitrate explosion which occurred at the Adair Fertilizer Company storage and distribution facility on April 17, 2013. The explosion occurred while responders were battling a fire at the facility. At least 15 people were killed and more than 160 were injured. It was determined that the fire led to the detonation of approximately 30 tone of Ammonium Nitrate. The building lacked any form of sprinkler system or any system to detect or suppress a fire. Mr. Anderson discussed the close proximity of residential housing, a nursing home, intermediate and high schools, all of which were devastated by the blast. The state of Texas does not have a statewide fire code and their law actually prohibits smaller counties from adopting one. Two videos were shown during the presentation, which Mr. Anderson said he would be happy to email to any members who request it. He then discussed ways the LEPCs can be more proactive with regard to these types of facilities.

<u>Yatabe Award Nominations</u> – Chief Knoff discussed the upcoming Yatabe Award and the Nomination Form that was included in the Agenda packet. He said that nominations must be received no later than August 31, 2013. Instructions and procedures were also included in the Agenda Packet. Members were advised to call Mr. Anderson if they had any additional questions.

Next Meeting – Chair Knoff announced the next quarterly meeting is scheduled for November 14, 2013 at the Northeast Regional Planning Council, 6850 Belfort Oaks Place, Jacksonville, Florida 32216.

No public comments were offered.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the LEPC, Chair Knoff adjourned the meeting at 11:40 am.

RE: Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) Planning Grant

Grant agreements/contracts have been received from the Florida Division of Emergency Management for the 2013/2014 fiscal year. The total contract amount of \$20,000 is allocated for HMEP Planning related activities.

HMEP Planning funds will be used to implement an annual project. The annual project for this year will be a Tabletop Exercise that will test the LEPC Hazardous Materials Response Plan.

An LEPC Exercise Sub-committee has been developed and recently met for the first time. Some of the general decisions made at the meeting were:

- 1) Conduct a Tabletop Exercise
- 2) Scenario will involve a train derailment in St. Johns County
- 3) Exercise date will be in late-February
- 4) Potential stakeholders to include

LEPC staff will be narrowing the scope of the exercise through the month of December. A mid-term planning conference will be scheduled for January to review exercise documents, scenario injects, and logistics.

Option 3: LOCAL EMERGENCY PLANNING COMMITTEE PLAN EXERCISE

Funding is provided to perform eligible activities as identified in the Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness Planning Grant Program. The staff assigned to this program should conduct activities pursuant to this scope of work with the support of the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) and consistent with the direction of the Division. The work tasks include, but are not limited to, the following activities.

<u>Task 1:</u> On behalf of the LEPC, provide staff support to the LEPC to develop and conduct an exercise of the LEPC hazardous materials emergency plan. Use the Homeland Security Exercise Evaluation Program (HSEEP) guidelines to develop, conduct and evaluate the exercise. The following exercise must be regional in scope to reflect an incident requiring a multi-jurisdictional or cooperative response and shall include a transportation element. The exercise must meet the following criteria:

- 1. A full-scale exercise that tests a minimum of two functional areas (e.g., communications, evacuation, resource management, etc.) or:
- 2. A comprehensive table top exercise utilizing a simulator / diorama that can be altered to closely reflect an actual location within the jurisdiction being tested. The exercise must test a minimum of two (2) functional areas (e.g., communications, evacuation, resource management, etc.)

<u>Task 2:</u> The required exercise staffing tasks at a minimum consist of the following:

- 1. Meet with local emergency management staff and local emergency response officials within the district to accomplish the following:
 - a. Explain the purpose and scope of the exercise;
 - b. Establish a method to coordinate procedures among local emergency response officials;
 - c. Identify key personnel to be involved in the exercise which shall include emergency management staff; and
 - d. Develop exercise goals and objectives.
- 2. Develop an exercise scenario. The following work products shall be completed and submitted to the Division for approval no less than **30 days** prior to the date of the exercise;
 - a. A detailed schedule of exercise events;
 - b. A summary of exercise messages; and
 - c. A listing of exercise control procedures and responsibilities.
- Following the completion of the exercise, all major participants shall meet to discuss the exercise and identify areas for improvement in the LEPC hazardous materials emergency plan.

<u>Task 3:</u> Submit an after-action report, using HSEEP guidelines, to the Division containing the results of the exercise, a summary of the post exercise meeting outlined in 3 above and subsequent recommendations. The report should also include information regarding what is being done, or will be done, to address the recommendations.

<u>Task 4:</u> Maintain accurate records of personnel hours spent performing the tasks outlined in this scope of work. Personnel participating in HMEP sponsored planning projects are to be counted toward the state's 20 percent contribution to the HMEP grant for the hours spent on the project. This "soft match" contribution must be documented by the Recipient and submitted on the year-end program summary (See Attachments K and N). Personnel hours paid with HMEP grant funds are not eligible for soft match.

<u>Task 5:</u> Incorporate the results of this planning project into the annual update of the LEPC's hazardous materials emergency response plan. For the purposes of this scope of work an actual event may *not* be substituted for the exercise requirement.

The quarterly meeting of the **District 4** <u>L</u>ocal <u>E</u>mergency <u>P</u>lanning <u>C</u>ommittee was held on August 14th, 2013 at the Northeast Florida Regional Council. The LEPC membership had the opportunity to listen to two (2) presentations.

- Sarrah Stanley, intern at NEFRC, discussed the results of the Commodity Flow Study for Hazardous Materials that was completed as our 2012-13 HMEP Planning project. Ms. Stanley provided an overview of the methodology for data collection, interstate/highway corridors observed, observation data, and recommendations for training based on most prevalent chemicals transported throughout the District 4 LEPC region.
- Eric Anderson, staff of the LEPC, gave a presentation on the West, Texas fertilizer plant explosion. This presentation covered the initial impacts of the explosion followed by a look at the continuing investigation. Staff highlighted the need to pre-plan responses to facilities with chemical hazards that pose a serious risk to people and the environment.

The next quarterly meeting of the LEPC will be held at the offices of the Northeast Florida Regional Council on Wednesday, November 13, 2013.

HMEP Planning

The District 4 LEPC will be conducting an exercise for the 2013-14 HMEP Planning project. A request has been submitted to FDEM for the approval of one (1) functional exercise to satisfy the grant requirements for HMEP Planning and the LEPC biennial exercise. Our goal is to conduct the exercise in early 2014.

Chief Joel Sneed of the St. Johns County F/R Department has been finalizing a study on the impacts of a train derailment in the City of St. Augustine. This report may serve as a great case study to use for the scenario. St. Augustine provides the backdrop for several opportunities to address that are unique to the region such as highly variable tourist and seasonal populations, dense groupings of critical facilities, impacts to Flagler University and the School for the Deaf and Blind, as well as others yet to be identified.

HMEP Training

The Training Sub-Committee selected and offered two training opportunities funded with HMEP Training dollars in the last quarter. Responders also had the opportunities to attend the TRANSCAER Chlorine A, B, & C kits course in Fernandina Beach, and an EPCRA responder refresher course offered in St. Johns County.

- 1) Compressed Gases Emergency Response in Transportation Classes were taught at the First Coast Technical College in St. Augustine on August 28, 29, and 30. A total of 72 responders had the opportunity to attend the training.
 - This was an 8-hour Technician/Operational level course that relates to the full spectrum Threat Response Operations for CBRNE-WMD Chemical real-world event preparedness and exercise issues. Program curriculum included technical and street-smart studies utilizing unique case study realities and suggested probable outcomes of critical care incidents offering emergency response countermeasures. All learning was reinforced via 90% hands-on practical and realistic training.
- 2) *Virginia HazMat Conference* The LEPC will be sending a responder to the Virginia HazMat Conference September 16-20, 2013. The purpose of attendance is to identify potential courses and instructors for the 2nd Annual HazMat Symposium in Daytona Beach in January, 2014.
- 3) *TRANSCAER Chlorine Course* TRANSCAER and FEC railroad offered chlorine training course in Fernandina Beach on August 14-15, 2013. Approximately 100 people attended the training on the new Chlorine A-Kits, and standard B and C-Kits.
- 4) *EPCRA Responder Refresher Course* Staff at the LEPC partnered with Lt. Johns Scott (Jacksonville F/R) and Chief Joel Sneed (St. Johns County F/R) to provide training on regulations of SARA Title III/EPCRA, electronic resources such as E-Plan and CAMEO, and a local study on the potential of a train derailment in the heart of St. Augustine.

- Three (3) 8-hour Chemical Suicide Workshops Operational Level

Hazards Analysis

Staff of the LEPC conducts hazards analysis site visits in five (5) of the region's seven (7) counties. Contracts are going through the approval process, and staff is ready to begin work detailed in the Scope of Work.

SUMMARY

The attached tables and graphs provide information on all hazardous materials incident reports received by the State Watch Office. The incident reports are reviewed by Hazardous Materials Planning staff on a daily basis for compliance and verification purposes. The information helps identify potential Section 304 violators, as well as facilities which may have an obligation to report under other sections of EPCRA and the Risk Management Planning (RMP) programs.

Table 1 - lists incidents by LEPC District for the period of June 1, 2013 through August 30, 2013. "Potential Section 304 Investigations" are incidents involving the release of Extremely Hazardous Substances (EHS) or Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) chemicals at fixed facilities and are investigated by State-level staff. In order for an incident to be covered under Section 304, the EHS or CERCLA chemical must meet or exceed its designated Reportable Quantity (RQ) and have potential for offsite exposure.

- **Table 2** provides a breakdown for fixed facilities of all hazardous material incidents where evacuations, injuries or deaths were reported (where available).
- Table 3 covers transportation related incidents and differentiates between chemical-related and traffic accident-related deaths. 


Graph I HAZARDOUS MATERIALS INCIDENT REPORTS

RE: Computer – Aided Management of Emergency Operations (CAMEO)

Mr. Tom Bergman will provide an overview of the <u>Computer – Aided Management of Emergency Operations (CAMEO)</u> program. Mr. Bergman will be the instructor for the course being offered at the Regional Council on November 13-15. In addition to being a Certified CAMEO instructor he is also the state of Oklahoma LEPC Coordinator.

CAMEO is an integrated software suite designed to aid emergency personnel in emergency planning, management, and response. It is comprised of 4 software programs, CAMEOfm, Marplot, CAMEO Chemicals, and Aloha. In essence, CAMEOfm is the database, much like Access, Filemaker, Oracle, etc. Marplot is the GIS or mapping program. CAMEO Chemicals is a chemical information database containing electronic versions of MSDS sheets, the Emergency Response Guidebook, and the CHRIS manual, Aloha is an air-dispersion modeling program.
